






Lantern Festival

Each year on the 15th night of the first lunar calendar month comes the new year's first full moon, symbolizing spring's arrival. Everywhere are colorful traditional lanterns, every household hanging them up, and happy people set off firecrackers, take part in lantern-riddle contests, and head out to admire the moon's beauty. Another beloved tradition is eating tangyuan (glutinous rice-flour balls) together, which symbolize reunion. These and other traditions celebrate the holiday and the continuation of the new spring.



Camphor Trail Dull-Ice Flowers

The Camphor Trail in Wenshan District presents you with special, idyllic hilly farm-country imagery. Along the way you're regaled with displays of bullock carts, retro bicycles, granary-style pavilions, and other attractions. Maokong farmers use dull-ice flowers as green manure. Each year after the winter tea crop is harvested dull-ice flower seeds are scattered, the flowers blooming after a wait of three months.

Each year March through April the dull-ice flowers along both sides of Maokong's Camphor Trail are in full bloom, forming a waving sea of yellow flowers. Come during this season for a refreshing stroll along this easy-grade trail, the sweet scent of dull-ice flowers wafting in the breeze.

Taipei Biennial 2020 / Nov.21,2020 to Mar.14,2021

The theme of this edition of the Taipei Biennial, being co-curated by the French scholar Bruno Latour and Martin Guinard, is "You and I Don't Live on the Same Planet." In addition, Eva Lin is serving as the special curator for public programs. A total of 57 individual creators and teams from 27 countries/territories are participating, as well as scholars and schools/departments spanning political science, sociology, geography, marine science, etc., engaged in humanities and history studies. They have built a development foundation of great diversity for this biennial edition.

It is hoped that the large number of exhibits will trigger the dynamic collision of ideas. The curatorial structure and spatial configuration have sculpted a base resembling a planetarium, using planets as basic unit and describing the gravitational pull between planets. In a series of public programs the moment when planets collide is simulated. The goal is to help visitors define the Earth they wish to live on.
